At Hawthorn we aim for our children to write clearly, accurately and coherently. We recognise that handwriting is one of the essential foundations for developing children's writing skills. Therefore, handwriting is taught daily across the school.

Children are taught to form their letters correctly and master each letter, so that when they reach KS2 they can develop joining letters.

The scheme that we follow to teach handwriting is Read Write Inc.

I have attached some guidance below, which you can use to support your child at home, if you wish.

Handwriting at Hawthorn

Right/ write sitting

Teach children the correct writing position at a table:

- bottom at back of chair
- feet flat on the floor
- body one fist from table
- shoulders down
- left/right hand holding the page
- left/right hand holding their pencil in the tripod grip.



The foundations for handwriting begins before any writing takes place. Children must be encouraged to sit correctly and hold their pencil or pen in the correct position.

Stage 2

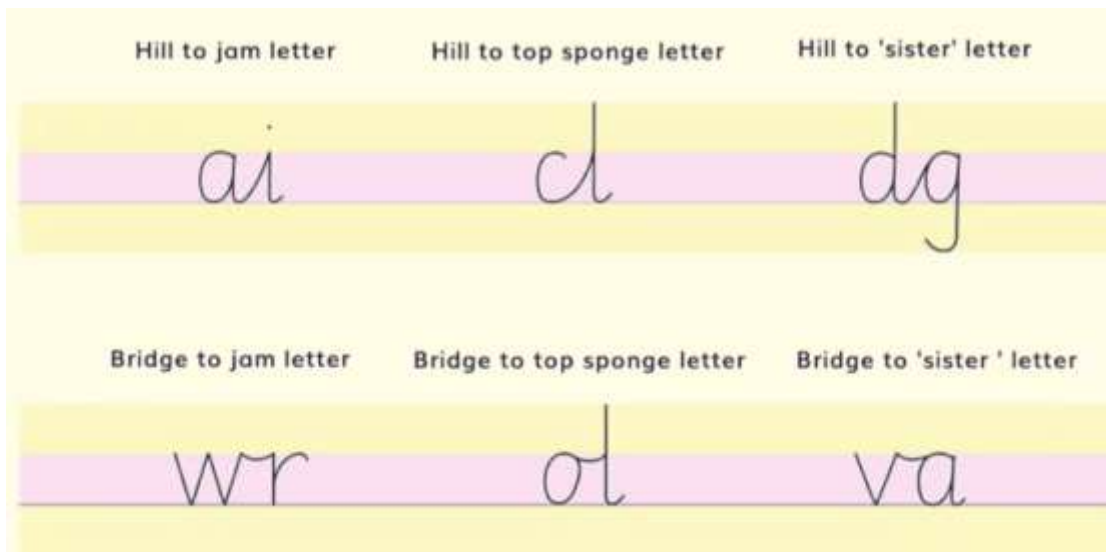
Children are taught how to form individual letters correctly. This is crucial for when they learn to join in stage 3.



We teach children to form lower case letters in the 'jam'. Ascenders go to the top of the 'sponge' and descenders go to the bottom of the 'sponge'.

Stage 3 Handwriting

They will learn two joins: the 'hill' join and the 'bridge' join. There are three variations of both joins:



Children practise each join with specific letter combinations. Then they write words with the joins they have practised. We teach children that all letters are joined with the 'hill' or 'bridge' join with the exception of g, j, q, y and z:

gap jump quit yak zoo

We modify some letters to allow them to join. For example, r, e and s.



Children will learn a style that looks like this:

Welcome back to Letter Village. At
Stage 3, children learn the 'hill'
and 'bridge' joins.

Stage 4 Handwriting

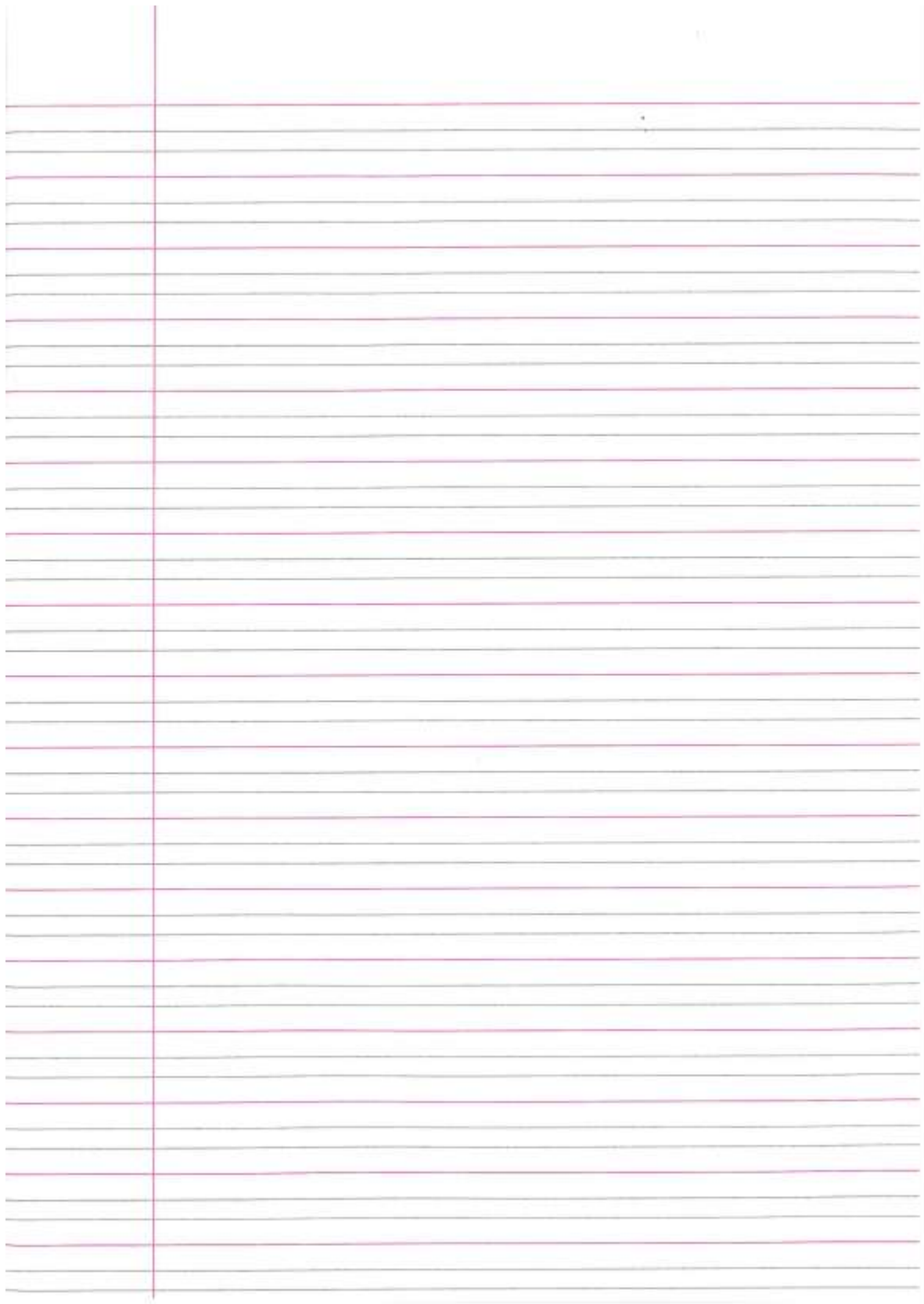
At stage 4, children learn to develop a mature style and increase their ability to write at speed.

At stage 4, children practise writing the 'hill' and 'bridge' joins, and build speed writing words and sentences.
