Prevent Policy Statement and Risk Assessment (March, 2023)

At Hawthorn Primary School, everyone who comes into contact with families and children within our school has a duty of care to report any safeguarding concerns. This includes the potential that an individual could be drawn into terrorism. This doesn't only include violent and aggressive acts, but the potential of radicalised views developing and the potential this can have on life chances and the risk these views can be exploited by groups who are looking to recruit members.

Radicalisation is when an individual becomes more radical in their thinking. This can be, but not limited towards, religion, political movements, social factors or groups of people. Extremism is when an individual holds extreme political or religious views.

Although an incident involving radicalisation hasn't happened at Hawthorn, we recognise the importance of remaining vigilant and informed about local issues which can impact on our families. We also recognise the role the internet can play in this process, and the impact COVID-19 lockdowns has had on pushing young people online. We play a vital role in teaching our children about how to stay safe online and report concerning content, as well as instilling the British Values at the heart of our curriculum and teaching children about the wider society which they are part of and will grow up and contribute to. We recognise that our school is a safe place for children to learn and think critically about the word around them and ask questions to clarify understanding.

Our risk assessment should be read in conjunction with Keeping Children Safe in Education 2022, The Revised Prevent Duty Guidance 2021 and our school Safeguarding and Child Protection Policy.

Prevent Risk Assessment: Hawthorn Primary School

Hawthorn Primary School recognises that it has a duty under Section 26 of the Counter-Terrorism and Security Act, 2015, in the exercise of its functions, to have due regard to the need to prevent people from being drawn into terrorism.
