Dear Parent / Carers

RE: Absence including lateness

As you are aware, in May Pathfinder Schools issued a new Attendance Policy. This is available on our school website. It defines attendance under the following categories:

^{*1} day = 2 sessions (morning and afternoon are counted as individual sessions)

Hawthorn Primary School recognises that illness is something that will and does happen, however, not all illness needs to be a day missed from school. If you are in doubt, please refer to the Public Health England chart which details the illnesses that require time off from school. If your child is not suffering with one of these, please send them into school and if we are concerned, we will contact you. If your child has a cold or cold like symptoms which can be controlled with paracetamol, contact the office for a medical form and we will administer this as per your direction.

In order to maintain excellent attendance, children can be absent for no more than 6 days in a school year. From September, we will need more information from you if your child is



absent from school. Reasons such as poorly, sick or ill are not sufficient, please expect that you will be telephoned and asked for more information.

Attendance Monitoring

When 5 days/10 sessions are missed, this will trigger attendance monitoring which will require medical evidence for us to authorise. If no improvement is seen during the monitoring period, this will be followed up with an invite to a Parent Contract Meeting and could result in the Local Authority issuing a fine.

If you have any concerns over attendance, please contact the school at the earliest opportunity. There are many ways in which we can support you. Thank you for your support with making sure your children are in school, on time and ready to learn.

Lateness

At Hawthorn we recognise the importance of every minute at school and making sure children get every opportunity to learn while they are at school. In order for children to receive this, they need to be in school to learn.

The table below shows the impact of being 10 minutes late:

Only missing just	That equals	Which is	Over 13 years of schooling that's
10 minutes per day	50 minutes per week	Nearly 1 ½ weeks per year	Nearly ½ a year
20 minutes per day	1 hour 40 minutes per week	Over 2 ½ weeks per year	Nearly 1 year
30 minutes per day	Half a day per week	4 weeks per year	Nearly 1 ½ years
1 hour per day	1 day per week	8 weeks per year	Over 2 ½ years

Lessons at Hawthorn Primary start at 8.50 am every day and children need to be in their classrooms at this time.

With this in mind, we would like to remind you on how we record and report on lateness:

- Gates open at 8.30am.
- The whistle will go at 8.40am. Children will go into school at this point.
- The gates will close at 8.45am. Entrance through the office will be necessary at this time, with parents signing children in and providing a reason for lateness. At this point,



children are classed as 'late before the register closes.' This will be recorded on their register code for this day.

• **Registers will close at 9am.** At this point, children are classed as late after the register closes. This is recorded as an unauthorised absence.

If there are 10 unauthorised sessions in a 6-week period, the Local Authority will issue a Fixed Penalty Notice/fine.

Chickenpox	at least 5 days from the onset of the rash and until all blisters have crusted over	
Diarrhoea and Vomiting	48 hours after their last episode	
Cold and flu-like illness (including COVID-19)	they no longer have a high temperature and feel well enough to attend. Follow the national guidance if they've tested positive for COVID-19	
Impetigo	their sores have crusted and healed, or 48 hours after they started antibiotics	
Measles	4 days after the rash first appeared	
Mumps	5 days after the swelling started	
Scabies	they've had their first treatment	
Scarlet fever	24 hours after they started taking antibiotics
